SMART (Start Making a Reader Today)	<p>SMART (Start Making a Reader Today) is an in-school early literacy program that serves children in public elementary schools throughout Oregon. We currently work in nearly 70 schools in Multnomah, Washington and Clackamas Counties. SMART pairs adult volunteers with K-3rd grade students who need additional reading help.</p> <p>We are pleased to serve eight East County schools this year in the Centennial, David Douglas, Gresham-Barlow, Parkrose and Reynolds School Districts.
